

February Flowers Trail

Look around the park to find picture cards with 10 flowers that bloom in February. Each card will have a letter, which when reshuffled spells out a February related word.

Helleborus are perennial flowering plants known for their elegant, nodding blooms that appear in winter and early spring. The ones on the card come in different shades of purple	
Violet are a diverse group of flowering plants belonging to the genus <i>Viola</i> , prized for their delicate, five-petaled blooms and heart-shaped leaves.	
Cyclamen are a genus of tuberous perennial flowering plants known for their distinctive swept-back petals and attractive, often marbled, heart-shaped or kidney-shaped leaves.	
Snowdrops (<i>Galanthus nivalis</i>) are small, white, nodding flowers that are among the first plants to bloom at the end of winter, often pushing their way through snow and frozen ground.	
Iris is the common name for a genus of perennial flowering plants known for their large, showy flowers and sword-shaped leaves.	
<i>Erica</i> refers primarily to a genus of over 800 species of evergreen heath/heather plants known for small, needle-like leaves and bell-shaped flowers.	
<u>Aconite</u> (<i>Eranthis hyemalis</i>) are small, early blooming (Feb-April) tuberous perennials with bright yellow, cup-shaped flowers	
The crocus is a genus of perennial corms known for their vibrant, cup-shaped flowers that are among the first to bloom in late winter to early spring.	
Pansies (<i>Viola x witrockiana</i>) are vibrant, cool-weather flowers celebrated for their "faces"—distinctive dark blotches in the centre of their petals. They commonly grow all winter.	
Primrose is a perennial flowering plant in the <i>Primula</i> genus, well-known as one of the first and most welcome signs of spring with its vibrant, rosette-forming blooms.
